The Sahel region faces complex security and development challenges, underpinned by widespread institutional fragility. Leading causes encompass impunity, corruption and significant gaps in access to justice. These factors, coupled with States' scarce ability to provide access to basic services and maintain order, originate a vicious circle of increasing insecurity, inter-community tensions and eroding trust towards State institutions. This picture contributes to the creation of fertile ground for the proliferation of violent extremism, insurgent and organized crime groups. It appears clear that to address instability in the region, efforts aimed at strengthening institutions specialized in the fight against terrorism and transnational organized crime need to be complemented by measures focused on addressing the systemic failures of the criminal justice chain.

With support from the Government of the Netherlands, in 2019 IDLO has launched a multi-sector program across three countries in the Sahel region to strengthen the criminal justice chain and support wide-reaching efforts towards peacebuilding, scaling up a model implemented in Mali since 2015. While there is a common understanding that a plethora of initiatives are being designed and implemented in the Sahel region, the overall picture often appears fragmented and different actors lack an accurate overview of where and how these various initiatives intersect.

By convening a range of implementing organizations active in the field of Security and the Rule of Law in the Sahel region, and in collaboration with the KPSRL, this *Implementer Dialogue* is an opportunity to stimulate targeted debate and exchange among relevant actors, with a view to:

- 1) Jointly map-out relevant and intersecting efforts;
- 2) Identifying synergies and boosting connections;
- 3) Exploring pathways for better coordination in the field.
